Viewing the latest news through the lens of Scripture

A video making the rounds this week showed a young man running into a neighbor's garage to get something. The neighbor had noticed some suspicious activity and checked back through her security camera footage to see what was going on and perhaps catch a criminal in action.

But no crime was being committed. The figure running up to the house turned out to be a little boy. And what was he getting out of the garage? A hug. The boy would often ride past the house on his bike and see the neighbor's dog, Duchess, in the open garage. Whenever he spotted him, the boy would drop his bike, run into the garage, give the dog a quick hug and several pats around the neck, then run back and hop on his bike again.

It was later reported that the little boy had apparently lost his own family dog not long ago when the dog died of old age. The boy, named Josh, just wanted to love on the neighbor's dog, and now he has official permission to come and play with Duchess any time he likes, thanks to the caring spirit of his neighbor.

As students arrive, give each of them a copy of the above story to read. Then discuss it in this way:

What struck you about this story? What did you think might be happening in the neighbor's garage at first?

How can having compassion for others help us to look for ways to understand people? How does having compassion prevent us from making assumptions?

Are there certain kinds of people you have trouble having compassion for? Why?
