Today we can find healthy eating plans to fit any nutritional needs, beautiful imagery of scenes around the world that we would never otherwise see, and the latest lyrics from creative minds just at the start of their careers. We can laugh and chat together, and even see each other across thousands and thousands of miles. But we also have access to tips on developing eating disorders, damaging pornographic photos, and explicit lyrics that assault our minds with dark, violent themes. We can make fun of people we'll probably never meet, and even systematically harass those we deem weak and vulnerable. We can insult, offend, ridicule, tear down, and do real harm to thousands upon thousands of people with just a few keystrokes and clicks.

So what do you think? Is it a blessing? Or is it a curse?

As students arrive, give each of them a copy of the article. Then discuss in this way:

How would you answer the questions posed at the end of this article? Explain your answers.

What are some factors of the Internet that make it especially dangerous? What are some potentially life-giving aspects of the Internet?

What do you think would help you to steer away from temptation on the Internet?
